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# Minutes from the April 11, 2024 Regular Board Meeting 2024

Chairperson Buchholz called the Thursday, April 11, 2024 meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

The meeting was held in person at the Historic Courthouse at 215 1<sup>st</sup> Ave, S, Long Prairie, MN 56347.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Call for Introductions.

Board members present in person were: Leland Buchholz, Wayne Wendel, Dale Katterhagen, Barb James and Tom Williamson.

Others present in person were: Deja Anton, District Manager, Adam Ossefoort, Division Director, Sarah Katterhagen, Program Coordinator, Tim Ebnet, Conservation Technician, Dylan Pratt, Conservation Technician, Josh Votruba, Conservation Technician, Kasen Christiansen, Conservation Technician, Luke Thoma, NRCS, Mae Petrehn, Ducks Unlimited, Barb Becker, Todd County Commissioner, Randy Neumann, Todd County Commissioner and Jackie Bauer, Todd County Coordinator.

Buchholz asked if there were any additions or corrections to the agenda. Katterhagen made a motion, seconded by Wendel to accept the revised agenda for the regular April 11, 2024 meeting.

James made a motion, seconded by Wendel to approve minutes as disbursed from the March 14, 2024 board meeting. Affirmative: Buchholz, Wendel, Katterhagen, James and Williamson. Motion Carried.

Buchholz asked the board to review March's 2024 Treasurer's Report. Wendel made a motion, seconded by James to accept March's 2024 Treasurer's Report with receipts totaling \$9,316.83 and disbursements totaling \$13,757.87. Affirmative: Buchholz, Wendel, Katterhagen, James and Williamson. Motion Carried.

Buchholz called for conflict of interest. No conflict of interest was reported.

## **Reports:**

**Commissioner's Report:** Commissioner Becker reported Solid Waste's building project will start in May, the Rock Wall project will start in July, and the houses will be removed from the recent property the County bought for additional parking. Neumann reported the County is looking at replacing material on the cupola and there

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will be a Lake Osakis Meeting on the 16<sup>th</sup> to discuss the proposal of forming a Lake Improvement District (LID).

**Director Update:** Ossefoort presented his visual report. Ossefoort also reported he applied for PLSS grant (a grant for surveying section corners), and the Department of Health Safe Water Drinking grant application was awarded. On the Planning Commission agenda there is a proposal of a Methane Digester to be built on Dairy Ridge's land. Ossefoort also reported the Division held a Contractor's meeting.

Ossefoort left the meeting at 8:45 a.m.

**SWCD Manager's Report:** Anton handed out her report. See her report for more details.

Anton reported Pratt attended an Irrigation and MACFO training, she also added that both Pratt and Ebnet reviewed the Manure Management Plan for Dairy Ridge and planned the Feedlot meeting.

Anton reported Votruba is working on obtaining JAA through the NRCS, attended Land Use Training, attended the Area II meeting, and sent out two buffer non-compliance letters.

Anton reported Christiansen held a recent TEP meeting and is working with US Fish and Wildlife on projects.

Anton reported S. Katterhagen requested permission to seek bids for tents, to book horse drawn rides and Science Museum. Board consensus to move forward with those requests. Anton also reported S. Katterhagen wrapped up the SWCD Audit and also responding the County Audit inquiries about SWCD's financials. Anton noted, that she reached to Clifton Larson Allen asking about the duplicated requests, and their response was they have new people working for them.

**Staff Report:** See Ossefoort's visual report and report under Director's update.

**NRCS Report:** Thoma reported the first round of EQIP applications are getting obligated, CSP deadline is April 12, 2024, and working on contracting. Petrehn introduced herself. She is with Ducks Unlimited and has been hired as the grazing specialist serving eight counties.

**1W1P SRWD Report:** No policy meeting. The implementation team is working on the project list for the second round of the funding.

**1W1P Red Eye Report:** No policy meeting. The implementation team is working on the project list for the third round of funding.

**1W1P Long Prairie Report:** No policy meeting. The steering committee is working on the budget and projects lists for the second round of funding.

**1W1P Crow Wing Report:** At the policy meeting they discussed the financials and work plan. Also the partnering boards will have to decide if they want a Joint Powers Board or a Collaboration agreement.

**1W1P Mississippi Brainerd Report:** No updates.

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**BWSR Report:** Mayers thanked Anton and S. Katterhagen for attending the Administrator Training on the 9<sup>th</sup> of April. Mayers reported the grant application for the Soil Health position was funded and the remaining funds will be used for Soil Health projects and the funds will be released in the summer. He also reported the Long Prairie Supplemental funds updated work plan was approved.





Please read excerpts from the plan below. The plan outlines management for each type of land found on the landowners property. The management focuses on forest sustainability, habitat, and several of our water protection goals. The excerpts are a few examples of this forest management plan matching the goals of the Long Prairie Watershed 1W1P objectives as adopted by the County and SWCD. Opposing the County objectives, this landowner is considering 2C. Todd SWCD will offer DNR cost-share and an easement option over entering into 2C.

# Section 1 - Landowner Goals

Goal 1: Maximize the timber value and growth in an environmentally

sensitive manner. Access the property with roads and trails.

Goal 2: To develop and maintain wildlife habitat for hunting and recreation.

Goal 3: Reduce property taxes with 2c Managed Forest Land tax class

#### Type 2 3 acres of Lowland Grass, Brush, and Small Trees

This type is the grassy slough and creek on the north side of the north forty. There is brush along the edges, mature alder, scattered ash, tamarack, spruce and willow. A sedge grass dominates the center of the type with small patches of open water in the middle. There are scattered lowland conifers also present. The thick brush provides excellent habitat and food source for grouse and deer. There are openings in the brush that are excellent for catching sight of passing deer and waterfowl. There are a couple small ponds, open water is excellent habitat for waterfowl and amphibians. Sedge grass is the predominant ground cover with smaller areas of cattails and reed canary grass. These wetlands are also important for catching large amounts of rainwater, filtering it, and allowing it to slowly seep into the ground water.

#### Management Recommendations;

Leave this cover type as is. The mature brush is difficult to access and provides good cover for wildlife. Place wood duck nesting boxes along open water areas.

Groundwater Protection

### Type 4 4 acres of Lowland Conifers

This type has merchantable black spruce, balsam fir and tamarack. The type is on the north side of the north forty. This makes for great wildlife diversity and cover type variation. These lowland conifer trees are on the small side averaging 30-40 feet in height, 8 inches DBH and are at medium density. Other species include small amounts of aspen, maple, and ash. As this stand matures and the trees grow larger, they will become more valuable for both lumber and pulp markets. The understory is open with scattered patches of alder brush; the ground cover is sphagnum moss and sedge grass.

#### Management Recommendations;

Leave timber stand. These conifer types provide excellent deer cover during hunting season. Large remote areas like this are difficult to hunt and allow many deer to reach maturity. These mature stands of lowland conifers are also used by spruce grouse, squirrels, chipmunks and many species of birds including wood ducks, owls, woodpeckers and various song birds. The spruce bogs also hold large amounts of water aiding in flood control.

#### Type 6 6 acres Upland Grass, Brush, and Small Trees

meadows and areas of light tree cover are good openings and great for a variety of wildlife. They provide food for deer, rodents, pheasants, raccoons, turkeys and many species of songbirds. They provide open space for observing this wildlife in

#### Alternative Recommendation;

These meadows would make great conifer plantations! Conifers should be planted at 600 to 800 trees per acre in the spring. Wider rows of trees provide more room for grass and weeds to grow in between. This makes great wildlife habitat for many years. I recommend planting a mixture of red and jack pine, white spruce, and balsam fir. This variety ensures better forest health and diversifies the wildlife potential. The natural jack pine could be weeded out or left to grow for species diversity.

This property meets the objectives of the LCCMR Grant. Todd SWCD will provide this landowner with information on the Forestry Easement, WBIF Easement, and the **Working Lands** Easements. Easements protect the land in its natural state. The location makes it a forest we wish to keep in permanency in order to protect water quality Long term. Fish Trap Creek runs through this property. Easements provide protection while keeping the land on the County tax roster. The goal would be to encourage the landowner to enter the easement, not 2C.

#### **Interesting Plan Features**

It is important to not try to physically remove the thinned tree from the woods if doing so in any way damages the crop trees by scraping the bark or breaking off tops. It is often the case that a large "wolf tree" that is older and has many large limbs is best girdled and left as a standing snag to avoid collateral damage. It will slowly rot and fall in small pieces creating much less damage.

Oaks are very valuable for wildlife due to their acorns (mast), which is a great food source for more than 100 species of vertebrates in the United States and many more invertebrates. (Acorns contain 6 percent protein and 25 percent fat by weight.) The oak trees in these two acres produce an average of cover type yield on average of 50 to 100 pounds of acorns per year. Red oak acorn production fluctuates on a two- to five-year cycle, so production varies greatly by year. That is a lot of valuable food for wildlife. And your oak savanna wildlife opening is a great place to see wildlife.

#### Additional Action to Achieve DFC - Plant berry thickets

3. Plant small clumps of fruiting shrubs, such as American plum, hawthorne, chokecherry, high-bush cranberry, red-osier dogwood, and juneberry in sunny areas to provide food and cover for many wildlife species, especially birds. Plum thickets provide soft mast and dense cover for deer.

The MN DNR State Nursery is a good place to get a packet of 500 fruiting shrubs for a competitive price (<a href="https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/forestry/nursery/pricelist.html">https://www.dnr.state.mn.us/forestry/nursery/pricelist.html</a>). Local county Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) often sell seedlings in smaller amounts if 500 is too many. If you get 500, you can plant some in multiple sunny locations on the edges of the food plots or elsewhere around your land.

Plant those that will grow the tallest to the north or center and then add successive rings of shorter species to create a thicket or thickets. Plant about 5 feet apart. Thickets can be from 20- to 200-feet in diameter. The results will be a wild orchard you and the wildlife can share.



# SERVICE AGREEMENT BETWEEN: THE COUNTY OF TODD AND THE TODD SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this \_\_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2021, by and between the COUNTY of TODD (hereinafter "County"), a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota, and the TODD SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota (hereinafter "SWCD"), the effective date of this Agreement shall be September 7, 2021, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, The County is a duly organized and existing political subdivision of the State of Minnesota, and,

WHEREAS, SWCD is a Soil and Water Conservation District organized and operating in accordance with Minnesota Statutes Chapter 103C, and,

WHEREAS, The parties hereto are authorized and empowered by M.S. 375.18 and M.S. 103C.231 to enter into cooperative agreements for the purpose of the powers of each of the parties hereto, and,

WHEREAS, SWCD desires to concentrate its time, energy and effort on the establishment and management of conservation practices and on stewardship promotion and conservation education, and,

WHEREAS, The County has, or will have, available the personnel such as Auditor/Treasurer and Human Resources, office space and equipment necessary to provide all administrative, personnel, financial management and other operational functions necessary to carry out the duties and programs of the SWCD;

NOW THEREFORE, It is agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

- 1. DIVISION NAME: The SWCD will be part of the Division referred to as Soil, Water Conservation and Development with two separate departments maintaining their identity: Todd Soil Water Conservation District and Todd County Planning and Zoning.
- 2. RECITALS: The recitals set forth in the whereas clauses are incorporated by reference as if fully set forth herein.
- 3. DUTIES OF COUNTY: That the County shall provide to the SWCD without cost to the District:
  - a. All office space, equipment, vehicles, and supplies;
  - b. All other office services such as telephone, copying and similar services, and;
  - c. A Division Director to administer and operate the programs and projects of the SWCD.
  - d. All personnel shall be and remain employees of the County and under its direction and control.
  - e. That the County shall retain ownership of all such equipment, supplies, and furniture acquired for the purpose of complying with this paragraph.
- 4. DUTIES OF SWCD: That the SWCD shall retain authority and shall be responsible for the development of natural resources conservation policy, a comprehensive natural resources conservation plan, and the approval, development, and management of conservation projects and all other powers

generally enumerated in M.S. 103C.331, except as otherwise herein specifically designated and allocated to the County.

The County hereby designates the SWCD responsibility for developing policy, writing an annual plan of work, and administering the following:

- a. Provide conservation practice technical assistance to landowners in cooperation with partnering agencies and organizations, public and private.
- b. Education programs related to land stewardship, water quality, and resource conservation;
- c. Provide factual findings to the Soil, Water, Conservation and Development Division;
- d. Administer and oversee state grants related to natural resources conservation;
- e. Appoint one (1) SWCD supervisor advisor to the Board of Adjustment and Planning Commission.
- 5. EQUIPMENT: All equipment, vehicles and property of the SWCD shall become the property of Todd County.

#### 6. SWCD BUDGET

- a. Project/Grant Funds: The SWCD shall retain the control, management and approval authority for all funds for conservation projects and practices including, by example, the receipt and disbursement of State grant funds, the receipt, disbursement and collection of loan funds, and any other funds specifically and directly related to a conservation practice. The SWCD shall maintain SWCD administrative and project funds in segregated accounts.
- b. Administrative Funds. The SWCD shall retain the control, management and approval authority for all general, discretionary and administrative funds received by it.
- c. Operating Budget: No later than October 31 of each year, the authorized representatives of the SWCD Board shall meet with the Todd County Board of Commissioners with a proposed budget for the following year.

7 LIABILITY: Nothing in the agreement shall obligate or cause either party to incur any liability as the result of the actions of the other party as to any specific duty or responsibility assumed or retained hereunder. The County shall not incur any liability by reason of any action taken by SWCD under the authority retained under Section 3. SWCD shall not incur any liability by reason of any action taken by the County under Sections 2 and 3.

The County Attorney shall represent SWCD in matters brought against SWCD. If Todd SWCD takes legal action against the county or county board they must use outside legal counsel since the County Attorney also represents the county.

8. LIAISON COMMITTEE AND ANNUAL MEETING: That there shall be established a natural resources and land use liaison committee consisting of two members of the County Board of Commissioners and two members of the Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors. The County Coordinator and/or Administrator, Soil, Water, Conservation and Development Director, and Soil and Water Conservation District Manager shall serve as non-voting advisory members. This committee shall serve as the liaison and personnel committee for the SWCD. Said committee shall meet upon the request of its members for purposes of program and policy review and to assist the Director and/or Manager with personnel decisions and matters of concern affecting the agreement. At least annually, prior to June 1 of each year, said committee shall meet for the purpose of reviewing the

effectiveness of this agreement, discussing budgets, and making a recommendation to their respective Boards as to the desirability of continuing the agreement. At least once per year, preferably in February, the entire Todd County Board of Commissioners and the Soil and Water Conservation District Board will meet in joint session to discuss SWCD's accomplishments for the past year and its work plan for the coming year. Other agenda items for the meeting may also be submitted one week prior to the meeting to allow proper public notice and preparation of board members for the meeting.

#### 9. EMPLOYEES:

a. Hiring

i. the Director of the Soil, Water, Conservation and Development Division and the Manager of the Soil and Water Conservation District shall be appointed by the Todd County Board of Commissioners, in accordance with Todd County Personnel Policy with the agreement of the SWCD Board of Supervisors. The liaison committee shall serve as the interview and recommendation committee for the hire of the Director and Manager

ii. staff positions shall be appointed in accordance with the Todd County Personnel Policy at the recommendation of the liaison committee. If the County Coordinator and/or Administrator refuses to appoint a position at the recommendation of the liaison committee, the matter is immediately forwarded to the County Board of Commissioners for potential overturn.

- b. Management of Division Director and SWCD Manager
  - i. will be under the day to day management and control of the Todd County Board of Commissioners and/or their designee. This includes all performance management, discipline or other management activities. Termination of the Director and Manager requires agreement by both Boards.
- c. Performance evaluation

i. performance evaluations will be conducted in accordance with Todd County Policy. The SWCD Board shall be offered the opportunity to comment on the performance evaluation of staff. The SWCD Board shall be allowed the opportunity to hold an independent evaluation of the Director and Manager, the said performance evaluation will be included in the employees personnel file.

- 10. CHAIN OF COMMAND: The SWCD Board and the Todd County Board of Commissioners recognizes that there is potential for miscommunication given the relationship between two elected Boards and the accountability of the Director and Manager. In recognition of that, both Boards agree to abide by a strict chain of command for all performance and management issues, which goes through the liaison committee in the absence of a County Coordinator and/or Administrator. Adherence to this chain of command will help to ensure a positive and smooth operation and collaboration.
- 11. EFFECTIVE DATE: CONTINUING EFFECT: This agreement shall be effective on the date set forth in the first paragraph of this Agreement and shall continue thereafter, from year to year, unless specifically terminated by either of the parties to this agreement to the other.
- 12. ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION: In the event there is a dispute that arises from this agreement and the collaborative operation of the departments, before engaging in termination, the parties agree to engage in alternative dispute resolution in accordance with county personnel policy.

- 13. TERMINATION: This agreement shall terminate with either party giving 60 days written notice to the other party of their desire to terminate the agreement prior to July 1 of any year of this agreement or of any extension thereof.
- 14. AMENDMENTS: Any amendments, deletions, or waivers of the provisions of this agreement shall be valid only when reduced to writing and signed by the parties.
- 15. SWCD FUNDS: When the SWCD has balanced all of its accounts payable and receivable the SWCD will provide the remaining funds to the County to be held in a trustee fund. The SWCD Board of Supervisors shall have authority over said funds.
- 16. ENTIRE AGREEMENT: This agreement shall constitute the entire agreement of the parties and shall supersede all oral and any prior agreements and negotiation between the parties relating to the subject matter herein.

## TODD SOIL AND WATER BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

#### A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING PRACTICE COST SHARE RATES FOR ALL FUND **SOURCES**

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has adopted the 2021 MN Statute 103.B801 Comprehensive Management Planning Program, now commonly referred to as One Watershed, One Plans (1W1P), to focus on the implementation of prioritized and targeted actions, including the installation of location specific best management practices, capable of achieving measurable progress (Subd. 2 (5);

WHEREAS, the Board of Soil and Water Resources (BWSR) provides Watershed-Based Implementation Funding (WBIF) to Soil and Water Conservation Districts to share the cost with land occupiers for specific prioritized practices in targeted locations while Todd SWCD also has access to other federal state, county, and local program sources of land occupier cost-share;

WHEREAS, cost share rates represent the percent of practice installation costs that may be provided to a land occupier including design, materials, and labor;

WHEREAS, BWSR Board establishes maximum allowable cost share rates through policy and implements these rates through grant agreements with Districts;

WHEREAS, district boards may set local cost share rates prior to receiving any applications from land occupiers, up to the maximum rate identified in BWSR policy;

WHEREAS, Todd SWCD staff request consistency in district cost-share rates across all programs to most efficiently assist landowners through the various programs;

BE IT RESOLVED, Todd SWCD District Board approves establishing the following percentage rates of the total actual costs of design, materials, and contractor\* installation:

- Up to 50% for well sealing contracts\*\*
- Up to 75% for any other best management practice contract

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in the event that a contract meets all of the following qualifiers:

- The practice is a priority practice written into the work plan or implementation schedule,
- The practice is in a targeted high priority area specifically outlined in the work plan or implementation schedule,
- The practice requires no Operation and Maintenance Plan on the part of the land occupier following installation (i.e. in the event of a recorded maintenance easement or component closure), and
- A 10% grant match has been obtained by the SWCD ahead of the contract going into effect.

a higher percentage based cost-share allowance not to exceed 100% of total costs may be set at the SWCD Board's discretion.

## **Conservation Contracts Program Policy**

From the Board of Water and Soil Resources, State of Minnesota

### **Policy Statement**

The Conservation Contracts Program is established via Minnesota Statutes (M.S.), §103C.501 to allocate funds to Soil and Water Conservation Districts (districts) for practices, projects, and systems (projects) for:

- Erosion and sedimentation control,
- Improvements to water quality or water quantity,
- Habitat enhancement,
- Plant biodiversity,
- Energy conservation, or
- Climate adaptation, resiliency, or mitigation.<sup>1</sup>

This policy applies to the Conservation Contracts Program and may apply to other funds allocated by BWSR to districts or other grantees based on legislative appropriation and/or board order. Program specific policy addendums may be used to identify additional or modified requirements.

## Reason for the policy

The purpose of this policy is to provide expectations for conservation activities implemented through the Conservation Contracts Program and other programs conforming to this policy based on board order.

BWSR will use grant agreements for assurance of deliverables and compliance with appropriate statutes, rules, and established policies. Willful or negligent disregard of relevant statutes, rules, and policies may lead to imposition of financial penalties or future sanctions on the grantee.

The BWSR Grants Administration Manual is the primary framework for grantee management of BWSR grant funds.

BWSR reserves the right to review and consider grantee administration of provisions subject to this policy.

## **Program Requirements**

#### 1. Eligible Activities

This policy supports use of funding for:

- Financial assistance for projects,
- Technical assistance,
- Project support,
- · Administration, and
- · Reporting.

Eligible activities must:

- Be identified in a state-approved plan established under M.S. Chapter 103B, 103C, 103D, 103F, 103G, or
- Leverage federal or other nonstate funds, or
- Address high-priority needs identified by the district based on public input.<sup>2</sup>

#### 2. Ineligible Activities

Funds may not be used for projects that are designed only to increase land productivity.<sup>3</sup>

#### 3. Financial Assistance

Grantees may provide financial assistance based on a percentage of installation cost, flat-rate, or incentive payments consistent with the procedures in the Implementing Contracts with Land Occupiers section of the **BWSR Grants Administration Manual.**

#### 4. Project Assurances

A contract is required when funds are used to provide financial assistance to install projects. Grantees have the responsibility to ensure that the installed conservation project(s) meet the requirements identified in the *Project and Practice Assurances* section of the BWSR Grants Administration Manual.

#### 5. Technical Quality Assurances

Grantees have the following responsibilities to ensure long-term public benefit of projects:

- **Technical Assistance Providers.** Ensure that identified technical assistance provider(s) have the appropriate technical expertise, skills, and training to their assigned role(s).
- Standards. Ensure the use of appropriate standards for design and installation.
- **Certification.** Certify that the project was installed according to applicable plans and specifications.
- **Operation and Maintenance.** Ensure an appropriate operation and maintenance plan is developed by qualified staff that identifies necessary activities and timing.
- Periodic Project Inspection. Conduct periodic project inspections to confirm the operation and maintenance plan is being followed and the project has not been altered or removed.<sup>4</sup>

#### 6. Financial Assistance Policy

Grantees are encouraged to adopt a financial assistance policy before entering any financial assistance contracts. See the *Recommended Local Policies and Requirements* section of the BWSR Grants Administration Manual.

#### 7. Grant Reporting

Requirements and procedures for grant reporting are found in the *Reporting Requirements for BWSR Grants* and *Closing out a BWSR Grant* sections of the BWSR Grants Administration Manual.

# Todd Soil and Water Board of Supervisors Cost-Share Policy for Cover Crop Practices

Approximately 63% of all acres in Todd County is classified as "cropland" (United States Department of Agriculture 2017 Agriculture Consensus). It has been common practice over the last century to leave cropland soils in clean shape for spring planting, meaning once the harvest is taken, the soils are disked black and left exposed to the elements. With many of Todd County soils being composed of sand or fine silts, erosion of the field service is a common occurrence in Todd County caused by winds, snow melt and rain, particularly in the late fall and spring portions of the year. Following the Dust Bowl and the formation of SWCDs, erosion has been a priority resource concern across the country. Erosion removes the most valuable growing layers of top soil and slowly depletes agricultural productivity. Erosion causes soil particulates to deposit into surface waters hastening the natural eutrophication of lakes and negative alteration of river, stream, and wetland habitats. Maintaining a cover on the soils and planting cover crops are considered a best management practice to control and reduce both water and wind erosion, no matter the size of field and type of coverage.

Whereas, Todd SWCD has consistently provided 75% cost-share for all agricultural related BMPs, and recognizing the enhancement value of cover crop practices to the economy and sustainability of Todd County agriculture and as an integral part of wise agricultural management and conservation of soil and water resources, Todd SWCD hereby adopts a 75% cost-share policy for the installation of cover crops that covers the following:

- 1) 75% of seed costs including shipping and application mediums
- 2) 75% of costs for bed preparation and seeding: only paid if landowner is limiting tillage to 2 passes
- 3) 75% of machinery, equipment, and man hours used for application of seed: machinery hours, rental fees, fly-on/aerial seeding, blowing, etc., equipment modification hours, and modification materials, based on most Current Iowa custom rates.
- 4) 75% of soil testing and soil amendments necessary to ensure the success of the cover crop.

Items not covered under this cost-share policy include:

- Cover Crop termination
- Fertilizers and amendments not required specifically by the cover crop itself
- Planting of Alfalfa and other primary crops
- Machinery purchase

The intent of the cost-share is to encourage farmers to install cover crops who have not installed covers before and to encourage a new level of cover crop installation such as a more complex seed mix for enhanced microbe biology in soils to farmers who have followed only the most basic cover crop (i.e. oats) practices in the past. Cover Crop installation must follow NRCS standards and Specs including Agronomy Tech Note 33. Farmers who accept cost-share are required to follow the recommendation of field technicians and agronomy plan approved by the SWCD.

There is no minimum acreage size but competing applications will be given heavier consideration for parcels larger in area that are adjacent to surface waters, and/or parcels in sensitive or watershed funding priority or targeted areas.

#### TODD COUNTY SOIL AND WATER BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

#### A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING COST-SHARE RATES FOR FOREST STEWARDSHIP PLANS

WHEREAS, Todd SWCD has entered into an agreement with BWSR titled the LCCMR Pilot Tree Planting Project 2023

WHEREAS, the Landowner Technical Assistance category includes the provision of cost-sharing Forest Stewardship Plans (FSP)

WHEREAS, the local team leads between East Ottertail, Wadena, Todd, Morrison, and Douglas came to agreement to cost-share FSPs at 75% to match existing cost-share policies (as opposed to a flat rate payment of \$300)

WHEREAS, FSPs are averaging between \$1000 and \$1600 per 160 ac. parcel

WHEREAS, FSPs are trending towards coverage of larger tracts of land, and equitable distribution of costshare funds allows for greater opportunity for landowner participation

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, Todd County Soil and Water will cost-share FSPs at a rate of 75% not to exceed \$1200 per plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this rate will not be limited to the LCCMR Pilot Tree Planting Project 2023, but to any FSP cost-share contract approved by the Board unless alternate funding sources change the rate per the fund source policy(ies) or requirement. In the case of the latter, the Board will revert to fund source allowable rates and limitations.
