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Minutes from the January 9, 2025 Regular Board Meeting

Chairperson Wendel called the Thursday, January 9, 2025 meeting to order at 8:31 a.m.

The meeting was held in person at the Historic Courthouse, Commissioner's Board room located at 215 1st Ave S, STE 104, Long Prairie, MN 56347.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Oath of Office was recited by Supervisor Wayne Wendel and Supervisor Larry Bebus.

Call for Introductions.

Board members present in person were: Wayne Wendel, Dale Katterhagen, Barb James, Tom Williamson and Larry Bebus.

Others present in person were: Adam Ossefoort, Division Director, Deja Anton, District Manager, Sarah Katterhagen, Program Coordinator, Dylan Pratt, Conservation Technician, Josh Votruba, Conservation Technician, Kasen Christiansen, Conservation Technician, Alyssa Scheve, Conservation Technician, Bob Byers, County Commissioner and Tim Denny, County Commissioner and Darren Mayers, BWSR.

Wendel asked if there were any additions or corrections to the agenda. Katterhagen made a motion, seconded by James to accept the revised agenda for the regular January 9, 2025 meeting.

Katterhagen made a motion, seconded by Williamson to approve minutes as disbursed from the December 12, 2024 regular board meeting. Affirmative: Wendel, Katterhagen, James, Williamson and Bebus. Motion Carried.

Wendel asked the board to review December 2024 Treasurer's Report. Katterhagen made a motion, seconded by Williamson to accept December 2024 Treasurer's Report with receipts totaling \$470,006.29 and disbursements totaling \$267,758.74.

Discussion: S. Katterhagen reminded the board this is a cash summary report. S. Katterhagen added some grants are 50, 40, 10 grants, some grants are 100% upfront and some grants are 100% reimbursement and most grants are 3-year grants. Todd SWCD sends invoices to partners for expenses related to WBIF grants. S. Katterhagen added this reported included 4th quarter wage adjustment back to the County in the amount of \$165,666.13. S. Katterhagen added each grant or program all have their individual grant tracking tool, so we know exactly what is left in the grant.

Affirmative: Wendel, Katterhagen, James, Williamson and Bebus. Motion Carried.

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Wendel called for conflict of interest. No conflict of interest was reported.

Celebrations: The SWCD welcomed Larry Bebus as the new AREA 4 SWCD Supervisor.

Reports:

Commissioner's Report: Commissioner Denny reported the County is working through Union Negotiations, yearend financials and Commissioner's recently approved new committee assignments for 2025.

Commissioner Byers reported the new contact for Parks and Trails for Todd County is Mitch Johnson, Todd County Maintenance department Supervisor. Byers also reported Battle Point Park may be updating a landing and may be reaching out to the Soil and Water office for assistance.

Director Report: Ossefoort reported the County adopted the cannabis ordinance and he will be having a meeting with Region 5 to discuss the County Comprehensive review and updating process.

SWCD Manager Report: Anton handed the board a written report at the meeting. See written reported for additional details. Anton reported the vacant position job announcement has been posted, large easement workload, completed feedlot spot checks, the Crow Wing watershed plan has been approved, and Todd SWCD requested \$100,000 for Crow Wing watershed. Anton explained to the board that the SWCD has grant funding to hosts work sessions and events off site. Anton also reported she has spent time writing up the white paper for purposing the change in BWSR grant policy for costing sharing feedlots over 500 animal units. Anton noted the Sauk River Watershed has adopted the Long Prairie WBIF cost share form that was created by Todd SWCD with some minor changes. Anton reported the tree planter has been ordered. Anton noted the Hewitt -Dam grant will allow advance payments for approved projects. Anton, presented the board corrections in the planning budget, which did not change total revenue or total expenses.

Staff Updates: Updates provided by Anton. Christiansen and Scheve attended the Annual MASWCD Convention. Scheve has received JAA (Job Approval Authority) and working with Red Eye Watershed for outreach materials and events. Pratt has been working on easements and potential future cost share projects. Votruba has also received JAA, working on wetland decisions and reviews for buffer compliance. Christiansen currently has no wetland violations to report, working on WCA reporting and on a wetland restoration project. S. Katterhagen is processing trees orders, assisting with feedlot meeting, working on yearend reporting, and the County septic program.

Staff Visual Report: Scheve presented her staff visual report which included photos from grazing site visits, easement site visits, cover crop projects and forestry site visits. She has been making site visits with Pheasants Forever, DNR, NRCS and with SWCD technicians.

Discussion Items:

Cover Crop policy – Response to landowners about paying too much for cover crops: Anton reported a landowner by mistake was sharing that he was getting 150% in cover crop payments, which was not true. The landowner thought he was getting 75% cost share rate from each funding source. (from each organization he was working with) By consensus, the SWCD board is not comfortable paying over 75% of the cost in cost share funds, including any incentives the landowner may be receiving. Board recommended to include a box on the assurance form, for applicants to list all the potential funding sources they may be working with for their project.

Update on AREA II Feedlot allowance for cost share for farms above 500 animal unites: On February 11, 2025 Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) will let AREA II know if BWSR approves the request for change in grant policy. Williamson expressed concerned that the cost share funding will disappear faster and concern that the SWCD will only be helping the larger farmers, and not the smaller farmers. Katterhagen noted the SWCD goal is to stop nutrients entering bodies of water and have to look at where the SWCD is getting the most for dollar for dollar. Board asked if we knew how many feedlots in Todd County were over 500 animal units. Staff didn't provide a number as they didn't know exactly how many were over 500 animal units without looking at a feedlot database dump.

Follow up from hosting meetings outside of Todd County: There is no County Commissioner policy for hosting meetings outside of Todd County. Anton reported for the Awards Luncheon program in October, she called twelve venues. The work session was originally scheduled to take place near Osakis, but the venue had a school field trip that day and she was informed at the last minute.

Propose a code of conduct between the SWCD and Todd County Commissioners for management-level discussion points:

The purpose of the board meeting is to provide guidance, make approvals, discuss policies, review budgets, and share information concerning the goals and objectives of the organization(s). SWCD meetings are open to the public and require a degree of transparency and professionalism. To ensure our meetings remain positive, efficient, and a productive use of time, it's essential that we operate cohesively while safeguarding the interests of the organization and its stakeholders. This includes the interests of County Commissioners, NRCS, BWSR, PF, Ducks Unlimited, Supervisors, and staff.

In 2024, we experienced some difficult disclosures. Examples include:

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- Disparaging comments or remarks made about staff members and/or their program policies.
- The sharing of management, administrator, liaison, or leadership-level information or discussion points that could be sensitive or negotiable.
- Hearsay—information that is not factual but rather something someone "heard", or surmises.
- Criticism of the organization or products developed by staff, which can be perceived as ridicule or harassment to some degree.

With the addition of new SWCD Board members and County Commissioner appointments, it is an opportune moment to start fresh.

Recommendations from Anton:

- Keep commentary as fact-based as possible.
- Any fears, worries, corrections, or concerns regarding products, programs, or stakeholders should be directed by Supervisors and Commissioners to the Chair/managers for proper vetting ahead of the meeting or directly following a meeting.
- Once the facts are gathered, the entire board will receive the revised or fact-based presentation of information for discussion, either through a liaison meeting or at a board meeting as presented by the Chair or Manager.

The board reviewed the AIS report as presented on the board packet. The AIS committee meeting will be held on Monday, January 13, 2025.

Board reviewed project status report.

The Todd SWCD 2024 Audit will be February 3rd and 4th.

The mileage rate for 2025 is \$0.70 per mile, increased from \$0.67 in 2024.

There may be an Amish Meeting over the winter in partnership with Planning and Zoning.

There will be a Contractor meeting over the winter in partnership with Planning and Zoning.

The Annual Feedlot Meeting – Wanted Dead or Alive will be Thursday, March 20th at Central Lakes College. Katterhagen recommended to contact Todd-Wadena to have a presentation on safety with electrical and powerlines.

Anton provided the board a list writes ups for potential award winners to be approved at March's meeting.

The board will be having a joint meeting with the Todd County Commissioner on February 18, 2025

Resource Concern and Project Purpose Description

The resource concern is mainly groundwater, wetland complex habitat protection, and feedlot watershed runoff with connectivity to Freeman's Creek, a tributary of the Long Prairie River. This was the location of a substantial feedlot/manure violation prior to Joe purchasing this site. This site has been significantly cleaned up but to meet compliance, the site still needs the pit upgraded, lot runoff controls added, improvements to waste transfer, and silage runoff collection and treatment. The existing pit will be upgraded to current standards, a second pit will be added to collect silage and north lot runoff, and transfer pipes and scrape lanes for waste transfer will be drawn into the plan for more efficient waste handling. This is one of the Big 3 Feedlot remaining environmental concerns in Todd County to be fixed. Joe has been on the cost-share list since 2017, and has finally received funding. Wells south of the farm have High Nitrates due to prior land abuse in the violation period.





Open lot runoff not meeting MinnFARM standards. Two solid manure stacking slabs, graded open lots, settling basin and a vegetative treatment area is planned for this project. An excessive amount of black soil was discovered in the open lot area requiring more excavation and fill increasing costs. Connectivity to an intermittent stream that reaches Eagle Creek. Eagle Creek is impaired for E.coli. Bacteria is a priority issue in a priority area in the Long Prairie 1W1P and 2023-24 Implementation Schedule.

March 13, 2025 update- Engineer estimates for the volume of black dirt removal and sand base were far under actual due to an elevation discrepancy. The invoice came in at \$94,424 as opposed to the engineer estimate at \$29,744. If the engineer signs off on the full volume, this would mean an increase in cost-share of \$41,074 or in combination with the previous amount approved, a total cost-share payment of \$70,818. An amendment request is being prepared and will be ready for consideration for approval pending engineer sign off and Long Prairie Steering Committee Approval.





Resource Concern and Project Purpose Description

The practice will cover 160 acres of land planted in mainly softwoods with a direct connection to Eagle Creek through ditching. The land lies in a priority area for long-term soil and water quality protection activities for the Long Prairie 1W1P. The land is hilly, sloping towards the ditch and has adjacent forestlands to the east. The objective of keeping this parcel under a FSP plan even though the owner is taking advantage of a 2C status, is for long-term protection of the ditch system between the hills. By keeping the land in trees, buffering qualities and soil resiliency reduce the amount of run-off, erosion, and phosphorous coming off the land with root uptake, and building soil structure with water holding capacity. This soil is subject to erosion.

Alternative Conservation or Management Practice(s) Considered

Alternative solutions were weighed regarding cost analysis, practicality of install, material availability, longevity, maintenance requirements, and effective resolution of cause. Alternate ideas would be to keep in under a plan, to manage the conifers, to take it out of 2C status would could lead to further agricultural activity, or to place the land in long-term protection for which there is currently no remaining funds.

Excerpt from Plan- Points of Interest:

General Description

The Kolodji family purchased 160 acres in the early 1900's. The land is located about 2 miles NE of Clarissa, MN off 354th St. The grandparents and parents farmed the property with dairy cattle and various field crops. The property has not been farmed since 1999 and most of the fields went into the CRP program. They were planted to a variety of trees including black and white spruce, Norway pine and tamarack. These trees are growing well. Some of the fields were planted back to native prairie grasses. They use their property for hunting in the fall. They have also harvested some of the firewood in the past and like to manage the forests for wildlife, timber value, and water quality. There are some wetlands on the property that are used by waterfowl, amphibians and other wildlife. **These ponds and wetlands also help control flooding as they hold large amounts of rainfall and slowly dissipate it back into the ground water.** The area is easily accessible with tails throughout the property. The land drains south into the Eagle Creek waters

34 Acres Northern Hardwoods:

These types are mixed northern hardwoods including **red and white oak, basswood, hard and soft maple, aspen, birch, and ash.** This is a nice stand of hardwoods that is tall and straight with minimal bole defect and no underbrush!! The most **dominant species** in the mixed hardwoods is **red oak**. **Maple and basswood are also prominent species**. Other species present are **aspen, ash, hard maple, birch, elm, ironwood, and hophornbeam**. The markets for basswood are poor, thus this is a hard tree to utilize. This stand is mature and starting to show signs of decay. The aspen and birch are dying out and slowly being replaced by maple, basswood and oak. **The medium quality of the oak is due to grazing in the past.**

4 acres of lowland conifers:

Management Recommendations; Leave timber stand. These conifer types provide excellent deer cover during hunting season. Large remote areas like this are difficult to hunt and allow many deer to reach maturity. The spruce bogs also hold large amounts of water aiding in flood control.

62 acres of young mixed Conifer Plantation:

This stand is a mix of white and black spruce, Norway pine and tamarack. It was machine planted in the early 2000s and has not been thinned. The 15' tall trees are tight and are growing well and should be due for thinning in about ten years. As in the other plantations, there are areas of aspen and birch volunteers in the stand. In the old days these were weeded out with much labor and cost. Today we do not need to spend the energy, and in fact this diversity is desirable for wildlife. The trees are growing at a rate of 1 ½ feet per year which is average to good for Norway pine.

Alternative Recommendation; In ten years, selectively thin this type in **swaths**. Make swaths through the pine at 45-degree angles to the rows to reduce the visual impact and still provide privacy. Leave the young interplanted trees in the swaths for additional cover. **Swath thinning across the rows reduces the risk of reserve trees bending or snapping over time.**

- The SWCD has obtained a 10% grant match from an alternative fund source ahead of the contract going into effect,

A higher percentage base cost allowance not to exceed 100% of the total cost may be set at the SWCD Board's discretion;

WHEREAS, the Swan Lake Association in conjunction with the SWCD was awarded a competitive Clean Water Fund grant from BWSR specifically for the purpose of Alum Treatment, a practice meeting all of the aforementioned qualifiers:

- lying in a targeted, a Priority One Area of the Mississippi Brainerd 1W1P,
- addressing the phosphorus reduction goal within the plan,
- having no Operation and Maintenance outside of the direct application times, and
- having clearly defined the 10% match sources.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that for the practice of alum treatment found within the C25-0169 Priority One: Big Swan Lake Phosphorus Reduction Grant, a higher based cost-share rate not to exceed 100% of the total practice cost is set by the SWCD Board, which is also not to exceed 90% unless other match sources fulfill the overall grant requirement of 10% match ahead of the practice installment.

WHEREAS, the Board of Soil and Water Resources (BWSR) provides watershed-based implementation funding (WBIF) to Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) to share costs with land occupiers for specific prioritized practices in targeted locations;

WHEREAS, SWCD boards may set local cost-share percentages prior to receiving any applications from land occupiers, up to the maximum rate identified in BWSR Policy, and

WHEREAS, Todd SWCD also has access to other federal, state, county, and local sources funding for land occupier cost-share, and

WHEREAS, consistency in district cost-share rates increases clarity in contract communications, efficiencies in process, and reductions human err

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Todd SWCD Board approves establishing a cost-share percentage rate of up to 75% of the total actual cost of design, materials, labor* and installation charges of any best management practice contract

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in the event that a contract meets all of the following qualifiers:

- The practice is in a targeted resource area specifically outlined in the work plan or implementation schedule,



Stormwater Best Management Practice

Alum Injection

Minimum Measure: Post Construction Stormwater Management in New Development and Redevelopment
Subcategory: Other



Description

The process of adding aluminum sulfate salt—otherwise known as alum—to stormwater is called alum injection. Alum combines with fine particles to merge into larger particles. Alum injection is particularly effective at reducing concentrations of soluble and particulate phosphorus, but the process is also applicable to other pollutants, particularly those associated with sediments. When stormwater professionals inject alum into stormwater, it forms precipitates of aluminum phosphate and aluminum hydroxide. These precipitates can combine with suspended solids, heavy metals and some microorganisms to settle into the sediment in a highly stable, inert state (Harper, 2007). A common term for the collected mass of alum precipitates, pollutants and sediments is floc.

Applicability

The primary use of alum injection is to reduce phosphorus concentrations, though alum injection can also be a pretreatment step to reduce turbidity, total suspended solids and bacteria (Kurz, 1998).

The most common application method is in-line alum injection, which is adding alum to stormwater within an existing storm sewer system before discharging it into a downstream basin. Due to high installation and operating costs, alum injection is most effective for large volumes of water that a system either conveys from a large drainage area or stores in a large basin. If the design requires floc recovery and disposal, adding a settling basin can allow for easy draining or dredging.

While the most common use of alum is as an in-line treatment of stormwater, another use is as an in situ treatment of surface waters such as lakes (Welch and Cooke, 1999; Harper, 2007), reservoirs and combined sewer overflow storage areas. In some cases, such as in combined sewer overflow storage areas, design engineers should develop a floc management plan to allow for the regular retrieval and disposal of accumulated floc. However, in lakes and reservoirs, floc

generally settles to the bottom, where it combines with the natural sediment.

Operators may have to adjust pH levels before or after alum dosing because the addition of alum makes water more acidic. Ferric chloride, which behaves similarly to alum but does not impact pH to the same extent, may be a suitable option for pH-sensitive waters (Pitt et al., 2004).

Siting and Design Considerations

In-Line Injection

Alum injection treatment systems generally consist of three parts: a flow-weighted dosing system that often fits inside a storm sewer manhole; remotely located storage tanks that provide alum to the dosing device; and a downstream basin with low flow velocities that allow the alum, pollutants, and sediments to settle out.

Operators determine dosage rates, which range from 5 to 10 milligrams of alum per liter, on a flow-weighted basis during storm events (Harper, 2007). The operator can add other chemicals, such as sodium hydroxide or lime, to adjust the pH before or after the injection

process to maintain the optimal pH range. For the alum floc itself, a pH range of 5.5 to 7.5 allows for minimum solubility of aluminum and thus maximum stability of the floc. Where receiving waters are subject to water quality standards for pH to protect aquatic biota, it is important that this stability range does not conflict with any standards. Chemical storage tanks should be large enough to minimize the frequency at which it is necessary to refill them.

In addition to a settling pond, operators may install a separate floc collection pump-out facility to reduce the chance of resuspension and transport of floc to receiving waterbodies. Incorporation of a sump or containment area may also make floc disposal easier (Harper, 2007). Proper disposal of the floc that settles in downstream basins is important because it may contain high concentrations of dissolved chemicals, metals, or viable bacteria and viruses (Kurz, 1998). Floc disposal can occur via a sanitary sewer system or a sludge drying bed with subsequent landfill disposal though prior approval is needed from the publicly owned treatment work. The publicly owned treatment work will typically require a permit for floc disposal, as the quantity of sludge a site produces can be as much as 0.5 percent of the volume of water the system treats (Gibb et al., 1991).

In Situ Application

In situ alum applications generally address internal phosphorus loading from lake or reservoir sediments. Phosphorus loading within a waterbody occurs when a

waterbody receives stormwater with high phosphorus concentrations over a long period of time, causing sediments to develop equally high phosphorus concentrations. Some sediments, such as clays, can also be naturally high in phosphorus. Water quality fluctuations can temporarily reduce phosphorus concentrations in the water, causing phosphorus that has bound to sediments to leach into the water (NALMS, 2004). In situ alum application can bind sediment phosphorus and reduce this leaching effect. However, consideration of in situ alum application should only occur after other types of stormwater controls have reduced stormwater loadings.

To design an in situ alum treatment plan, there should be preliminary water quality investigations to identify potential reactants, targeted pollutants and the degree of treatment desired. Dosing generally occurs via boatmounted mechanical sprayers over the course of one to several days, depending on the size of the waterbody.

Limitations

While alum injection has shown effectiveness as a stormwater treatment method, it has several limitations, including the following:

- Limited information is available about the long-term effects of alum injection on downstream biota.
- Alum injection requires much greater levels of ongoing operation and maintenance than most other post-construction stormwater treatment controls.
- Operators should carefully monitor and adjust chemical additions during the alum injection process to prevent negative effects on downstream waters, including toxic effects of aluminum or other heavy metals.
- Operators may need to dispose of the precipitates from the alum in a particular manner, depending on local regulations.
- Alum injection is typically not cost-effective for drainage areas less than 50 acres.

Maintenance Considerations

Proper operation and maintenance of an alum treatment system is critical. Typical actions include:

- Routine inspection and repair of equipment, including the dosing device and pump-out facility.
- Adjusting the dosage of alum and other chemicals by a trained operator to maintain consistent operation if flows through the basin vary.
- Regular disposal of floc stored on-site in drying beds.
- Periodic dredging of the settling basin to dispose of accumulated floc.

Effectiveness

When its designs are correct, alum injection can result in total phosphorus reductions of 85 to 95 percent, total suspended solids reductions in excess of 95 percent and bacteria reductions in excess of 99 percent. Alum injection can reduce total nitrogen concentrations by around 50 percent, though results vary and highly depend on nitrogen speciation (Harper, 2007; Pinellas County, 2017). There have been reports of lower rates of total phosphorus removal, with influent total phosphorus values of 0.2 to 0.3 milligrams per liter being reduced to around 0.1 milligrams per liter or fewer (approximately 40 percent reductions), but these were likely due to an undersized settling basin (Carr, 1998). For information regarding cost per kilogram of pollutant removed, refer to the "Cost Considerations" section below.

For in situ lake and reservoir applications, a single application can be effective for 5 to 15 years, using sustained reductions in phosphorus and algal concentrations as a metric (Welch and Cooke, 1999). In some cases, such as areas where high stormwater loadings continue or areas with unique sediment chemistry, operators may want more frequent applications (NALMS, 2004).

Cost Considerations

Alum injection is a relatively expensive practice. A 2007 life cycle cost analysis of four large-scale stormwater treatment facilities found total costs—including capital, operation and maintenance costs over a 20-year period—to be between \$1 and \$4 million (Harper, 2007). However, when considering the cost versus weight of nutrients that alum injection facilities removed, these facilities performed better than standard wet detention facilities. Moreover, alum injection facilities generally require less space than their conventional postconstruction control counterparts. In terms of cost per kilogram of pollutant removed, alum injection is an affordable option for removing total suspended solids, with a cost between \$30 to \$79 per kilogram removed. Nitrogen and phosphorus removal costs vary between \$314 and \$4,166 per kilogram and \$1,736 and \$10,496 per kilogram removed, respectively (Harper, 2007).

The information you provide is considered public information, and can be retrieved upon request from any member of the public. Here is a list of specific data the SWCD will request when you prepare to partake in Todd SWCD cost-share programs and how we use this data:

- 1. Name(s) and parcel information- These two pieces of information are used as the main identifiers for your project, as a title for the project, as a mechanism for tracking and filing in the SWCD electronic and hard files, and can be reported to the Board of Soil and Water Resources in the state E-Link Data base. This information can be entered into the Todd County Public GIS Viewer and ArcView to view your property from an aerial photograph or to find the best driving route to your property.
- 2. **Address** This information allows Todd SWCD to send informational documents pertaining to the project to your residence. Information may include project designs, bid packets, cost estimates, cost-share approval letters, payment vouchers, and permitting information. This information can be typed in to the Todd County GIS Viewer and ArcView to view your property from an aerial photograph or to find the best driving route to your property. Our technicians and engineers may enter your address into Google Maps or other similar programs that offer directions. It allows Todd County to send a check for payment to your residence.
- 3. **Legal description of property and project type** This information is captured so that we can map the location of the project both internally in our electronic files, and in the State E-link database. It is also used on contracts, permits, and affidavits of record that may be required by our programs.
- 4. **Project cost and % cost-shared-** This information is presented to the SWCD Board for contract and payment approval consideration. This information is listed on the cost-share contract which is public information.
- 5. **Signatures:** Signatures are required on contracts, vouchers, permits, engineer plans, utility notices, and operation and maintenance plans and other documents.

All of the above information (1-5) may be referenced on the Board of Supervisors meeting agenda and Board packet, can be posted to the Todd SWCD and County website and is discussed in open meetings led by SWCD supervisors and Todd County Commissioners. These meetings are open to the public.

All of the above information (1-5) is required to be provided by you in order to enter into contract with Todd SWCD and receive payments.

6. **Telephone numbers and emails**- This information is used to correspond with you about your project. <u>If</u> you provide it on a document, this information becomes public information.

It is important to note that any data provided to the SWCD may be shared upon court order, and can be provided to the state or legislative auditor.

Re: NACD Update on Recent Executive Actions

I am writing to provide an update on recent Executive Actions.

IRA and Funding Actions

On February 20, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins announced that USDA would honor existing contracts with producers and released \$20 million in Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), and Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) funds. USDA will continue to assess federal obligations and make additional announcements.

On February 21, NACD issued a press release to commend this important first step, encourage USDA to provide more certainty for future producer contracts, and request that the agency commit to distributing financial assistance through conservation programs funded by the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) and Partnerships for Climate Smart Commodities (PCSC).

NACD understands that many grant payments resumed the week of February 24, once USDA payment systems (FMMI) were back online. Exceptions included payments under agreements funded by IRA, Infrastructure Investments & Jobs Act (IIJA), and PCSC.

As of February 28, members have reported conflicting guidance from USDA. As of the release of this memo, NACD is not aware of USDA freezing payments, with the exception of those listed above. We also understand that payments for expenses incurred through February 25, 2025 under Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) and PCSC will be released shortly.

Grant Terminations

On February 14, USDA began issuing letters formally terminating grants and agreements, particularly those funding diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility initiatives. As the Secretary continues to review grants and agreements, additional termination letters may be issued for initiatives or programs that are not aligned with the administration's priorities.

On February 26, President Trump issued an <u>executive order</u> directing each federal agency to coordinate with the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) to:

1. Establish a system to record every payment issued by the agency pursuant to each of the agency's covered contracts and grants, along with justification for each payment.

<u>Note</u>: NACD understands that USDA is continuing to make payments under grants or agreements with COTA and non-IRA Farm Bill funding. While we anticipate that additional



RCPP and PCSC funds will be released today, it is our understanding that payments under grants or agreements with IRA or IIJA funds are still on hold. However, USDA continues to assess and justify each grant and agreement to determine whether it aligns with the administration's priorities and provides benefit. NACD encourages districts to reach out to their federal program administrators to share the positive impacts grants and agreements are providing for producers, local communities, and environmental health.

2. Conduct a comprehensive review of each agency's contracting policies, procedures, and personnel, and to issue guidance on signing new contracts or modifying existing contracts to promote efficiency and alignment with the administration's policies.

<u>Note</u>: NACD contacted FPAC's Grants and Agreements Division to understand if there are opportunities for appeal, based on the initial round of grant terminations on February 14, 2025. USDA's general terms and conditions allow the government to terminate a grant or agreement when its priorities change. As such, there is no room for administrative appeal. The appeals process only applies if the agency makes the claim that the recipient is not fulfilling their commitments (e.g., poor performance, missed deliverables). Recipients were required to submit their final payment request along with final financial and progress reports to complete closeout.

3. Identify all termination rights agencies may have under existing leases of governmentowned real property. The order does allow agencies, in coordination with DOGE, to make exclusions.

<u>Note</u>: NACD has raised our members' concerns regarding lease terminations and impacts on their customer service to producers, partnerships with USDA, and district operations.

Federal Layoffs:

Since February 14, it is estimated that as many as 220,000 federal employees have been terminated, most of whom were probationary staff.

- The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) issued ~1,200 termination letters to employees.
- The U.S. Forest Service (USFS) has issued termination letters to ~ 3,400 federal employees on probationary status across every level of the agency. Public safety employees at USFS are exempt.
 - o It has been reported that the USFS is identifying a "small" number of terminated employees to be rehired and that managers may have an opportunity to request the return of additional staff.
- The Department of the Interior (DOI) has issued termination letters to ~ 2,300 federal employees on probationary status, including 800 from the Bureau of Land Management and 420 from the Fish and Wildlife Service.
- The Environmental Protection Agency has issued termination letters to ~ 388 federal employees.

On February 20, NACD issued a <u>press release</u> highlighting the severe impacts recent federal layoffs are having on producers and the delivery of locally led conservation. The release also calls for immediate action to mitigate these harmful effects. There are reports of a small number



of employees being rehired within some agencies, including USDA. To our knowledge, this has not yet included NRCS.

On February 22, Office of Personnel Management (OPM) sent an email with the subject "What did you do last week" to anyone with a ".gov" email. The recipient was asked to reply to the email with a summary of their accomplishments for the week. Many conservation district employees, contractors, and other non-federal employees received this email. NACD met with USDA leadership and confirmed that as non-federal employees, conservation district partners and their associations are not required to respond. Subsequently, the USDA Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration communicated that any response to the email is not required and considered voluntary.

On February 26, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and OPM sent a memo to federal agencies providing guidance to achieve portions of a previous executive order. The memo requires agency heads to develop Agency Reduction in Force (RIF) and Reorganization Plans (ARRP) to reduce full-time staff, real property footprints, and topline budgets. Agency leaders are directed to submit the first phase "focused on initial agency cuts and reductions" of the ARRP by March 13. The memo includes an exemption for "agencies or components that provide direct services to citizens." NACD has not yet confirmed that NRCS employees and additional federal conservation employees and partners qualify for this exemption.

On February 27, a federal judge ordered OPM to rescind directives initiating mass firings of probationary workers across the government on the basis that OPM does not have the authority to terminate employees within other agencies. The administration argues that OPM issued guidance, not a directive, to terminate employees. It is unclear what the immediate impact of this ruling will be and how it will affect federal workers already terminated. A written order is expected later, and the judge scheduled a court hearing on March 13.

Forest Service:

On February 26, Forest Service Chief Randy Moore announced his retirement in a letter to agency staff. The letter is posted in the <u>Inside the Forest Service newsletter</u> and his retirement is effective March 3, 2025.

On February 27, Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins appointed Tom Schultz as the new Chief of the Forest Service. Schultz has more than 25 years of land management experience and previously worked for the Idaho Forest Group, the Idaho Department of Lands, and Montana's Department of Natural Resources and Conservation.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA):

Section 319 Nonpoint Source Management Program funds and Clean Water State Revolving funds <u>not</u> funded by IRA or IIJA are expected to be released soon if still frozen. EPA and IIJA and IRA funding is still under review.

Department of the Interior:

Pursuant to the January 20 Executive Order titled "Unleashing American Energy," Secretary Burgum has announced plans to prioritize the mapping of all potential energy resources (oil, gas, and critical minerals) on Federal Lands.



• Bureau of Land Management (BLM):

Kathleen Sgamma, head of the Denver-based Western Energy Alliance, has been nominated to be the Director of BLM. There is no date set for Sgamma's Senate hearing. For more information on BLM specific inquiries, please contact your state or regional office.

• Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS):

Brian Nesvik, recently retired Director of the Wyoming Game and Fish Department, has been nominated to serve as Director of the USFWS. Nesvik's Senate hearing has not yet been scheduled. Fish and Wildlife staff remain committed to partnerships with NACD and local districts. They are working to determine ways they can assist at the local and regional level.

NACD Call for Action

NACD issued a <u>survey</u> to all members to better understand the local impacts of executive actions. We have received more than 350 responses and appreciate your candid input. Thank you to those who have completed the survey, and we encourage all districts to share local impacts and updates as the situation develops. NACD staff are reviewing each submission and contacting those who requested a response. This survey is anonymous. You can view NACD's first <u>survey report here</u>, which includes anonymized responses from conservation districts across the country.

On February 18, NACD issued a letter template to assist conservation districts and their associations in sharing stories and impacts of administrative actions with members of Congress. Thank you to those who have reached out to your representatives. We encourage all districts to share specific local impacts with lawmakers and send updates as the situation develops.

Summary

Executive orders continue to be introduced, and the impacts of many recent actions are still unclear. Federal agencies are still working to interpret and implement these orders and will share additional guidance as soon as possible.

NACD encourages members to contact NACD's Director of Government Affairs, Chris Young (chris-young@nacdnet.org) to share updates and concerns related to the impacts of recent executive actions. This information will inform NACD's engagement with agency and congressional leaders.
